Let us extend our warmest congratulations to these worthy Knights, whose accomplishments merit our customary round of applause.

I especially commend, and thank the two Provincial Constables, E. Kts. Adrian Moseley and Tim Cox – They did a tremendous job, visiting extensively on their own account within our Province and attending the annual meetings of several other Provinces, too. Well done both of you!

Among others stepping down is our Vice-Chancellor, V. E. Kt. Martin Levick, who deserves a well-earned break after the exceptionally challenging period of the past three years or so. You helped the Province navigate through some stormy seas, Martin.

Another one stepping down after 7 years in the office is our Provincial Treasurer, E. Kt. Steve Halberg. He too has done an outstanding job and deserves the praise of all of us. Thank you, Steve.

We had several highlights in our activities over the past year. Amongst these was the Bodyguard Mess, a Sunday Lunch held in February. The presence of our ladies and other guests made this event even more delightful. This annual gathering continues to grow in popularity, and this year, we had a record attendance of nearly 80 and I congratulate the organisers, E. Kt. Ivor Hallam and Kt. Mark Driffill. They also arranged a similar evening event in August, which was an equally great success.

We've also been busy dedicating new Banners & Standards. In May, at St Pauls Preceptory No.466, we dedicated two new Malta Banners, provided through the generosity of one of its members, E. Kt. Keith Appleton. Well done to you Keith.

Another noteworthy occasion was the consecration of the Preceptory Banner for our newest Preceptory, the Aslackby Preceptory No. 718 in March. It was a pleasure to see the Banner being proudly paraded alongside others earlier in our meeting here today. And I'm very pleased to

congratulate the Preceptory on its continued success in attracting new members.

Turning to the topic of charity, I express gratitude on behalf of the Jerusalem Eye Hospital and this glorious Cathedral for your ongoing and generous support. Your willingness to contribute to these worthy causes is deeply appreciated.

In connection with this, I again commend the work of Lincolnshire Pre-loved Regalia. In the two years of their existence, they have raised a total not far short of £20 000 for charities supported by Orders in this Province, in our case, the Eye Hospital. Well done to them.

Next, a few words about the important matter of membership - how has that fared over the past year, you may be wondering.

Well, the answer is - we've had a rather lean year, in fact. Resignations were higher than is typical, but all of them for perfectly understandable reasons. But also, and very sadly, we had an exceptionally high number of Knights being called to a higher service. As a result, our actual numbers, or swords, reduced by just over 3%.

So - in the coming year we need to redouble our efforts to attract suitable new members. This should be a shared concern among all of us, but I particularly urge Preceptory Constables to prioritize this matter in preparation for their future leadership roles.

Similarly, for Knights who are regularly absent, they should be in no doubt that they are missed. We should strive to encourage their return, and find appropriate ways to facilitate this, and to re-engage their interest.

The good news though, is that some of our Preceptories are already reporting a surge of interest from potential candidates, and I feel confident that others will soon follow. As we all know, the addition of new members significantly enhances the vibrancy of a Preceptory. The emphasis is of course, on suitable, good quality candidates – it's most certainly not all about the numbers.

Bro. Knights, today is an occasion when, once again, I become acutely conscious of what a fantastic team effort it all involves. So many Knights, all working their socks off to make it a happy and successful day for all the rest of us.

I also thank our Provincial Marshal, E. Kt Mark Thornton, and Deputy Marshal, E. Kt. Iain Dean. Well done to both of you.

A special thank you goes to all the members of the Provincial Bodyguard, led by their Commander Kt. David Carter and Deputy E. Kt. Mike Lock. Well done and I look forward to our upcoming Team Visits together in the year ahead.

And, additionally, we are all indebted to the members of St. Pauls Preceptory No.466 for their assistance in setting up for today's meeting as the Host Preceptory.

Many other Knights have worked tirelessly to ensure the smooth running of today's meeting. A big thank you to all of you.

On a personal note, I want to offer my heartfelt thanks for the warm friendship, kindness and unwavering support you've all bestowed upon me as your Provincial Prior.
